

DESCRIPTIVE REPORT

To accompany topographic sheet of Hana Cove, Maui, T.H. Surveyed June, 1924

Ecline R.Hand, Chief of Party.

The survey was controlled rigidly by the four triangulation stations:

KA PUKAULUA, PUU O KA HAULA, NANUALELE (misspelled on the data furnished me) and

KAUIKI. There were no errors of traverse and therefore no adjustments in any
place. These positions were plotted on the projection in accordance with the data
furnished me: but I notice they do not fit the values that I scaled off the bromide of topog sheet 3274. Presumably different datum. I do not know which is
finally to be accepted but there ought to be consistency; for instance, the position of Hana Light, as given in the Light List, does not fit my value furnished
in my List of Positions. Their height is 85 for focal plane of light: I do not
know how closely they obtain those heights, therefore cannot say if 84 or 85 is
the better. I know my value was carefully obtained, but the matter seems of little
practical importance - a foot's difference. We ought to get together, though, on
the position.

I can add but little information beyond what I show: the cannery is new: capacity when running full (not yet going) will be a million cases a year, 24 cans to case. They are held up by lack of water now. The wharf is new: a fine structure of concrete: the moor. buoys belong th plantation, Kaeleku Sugar Co. There is an oil tank (fuel) at pineapple place, capacity 15000 bbls. a pipeline from wharf.

It may be said the semi-cone shown behind wharf is not natural: it is not, I agree. The high cliff was actually Blasted down to make a big fill for the wharf. I have endeavored to show how it now appears.

I have described the range: it is most useful. It would seem a good thing to follow the British custom and make a sketch of this range. I submit a photograph of this range: the after range is not the light spot away up but is the gable in the shadow, it may be clearly made out under a glass.

This city is quite isolated; the road to the south runs about fifteen miles or so and then stops, there is no road connection around that way, though it is possible to come down the famous Haleakala crater and out Hana way, from Wailuku. To the north the road runs about twelve miles, but a highway is now being built all the way to "ailulu, the large town on the north side of Maui. Optimists believe this way will be open in 1925. At present, at the end of this twelve mile stretch of road one goes over the well advertised Ditch Trail, a horse.

back ride of wondrous beauty, and thrills. There is a steamer in to Hana once a week, the Mauna Hea, of the Inter-Island S.S.Co. it calls in FRIBATEN usually, from Honolulu, with freight and passengers, goes on to Hawaii, and back again the next day, Saturday, for the return to Honolulu.

The sunken rock shown on the section of topog. sheet 3274 is not a single rock, but an extensive patch: it is generally breaking. However I did discover and locate a pinnacle as shown, just NW of the red buoy, No. 2. It has sixteen (16) feet over it, reduced.

For further information on this survey see my report to the Director, dated June 30, on the execution of Orders of 3/25/24 (7mcs)

The Range was carefully determined at its outer end. Taking average of best values I have decided that a point 668 m. from sta. NANUALELE, on az. 3248 10 should control it.



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Report on Hydrography shown on Top. Sheet No 4059

The hydrography done in Hana Cove, consists of two days work, Part of the work is controlled by three point fixes and the balance by cross ranges. Everything was verified with the exception of a few ranges, which could not be identified. These were shown in the same position in which

they had been plotted by the field party.

The record is not well kept and is hard to decipher in places.

I have the honor to report the accomplishment of your Instructions for the above subject, dated arch 25, 1924 (7-mcs) Your letter stated when practicable to do so, and at such time as will least interfere with the work on which you are now engaged * * I felt that at the close of my Waianae survey would be a fine time for this, since there would follow some days of shifting the sounding boat, equipment, camp gear etc. to the new field on the other side of the island, recovery of trig. stations, signal building, erection of tide gauge and starting of tidal observations, the less-technical deta tails of which could as well be handled by my assistant, Mr. Sgt. Constant Yan Hapert of the 3rd. Engrs.

- And so, the advance details having been arranged from Honolulu, topographic sheet prepared etc. I left with two experienced men on June 4th, and arrived in Hana, Haui, the next day. Now the boat calls in there but once a week: I doubted I could finish in two weeks and believed it ought not to take three, so decided the survey HAD to be accomplished in the shorter period, that the party might not lie idle awaiting transportation. To this end we pushed forward on the project with much more than usual application, the happy result being that I had everything satisfactorily completed twenty four hours before the return of the Mauna Kea on her third arrival. The party left Hana on June 21 and reached Honolulu the next day, Sunday.
- I believe you will find the survey conforming to your requirements as stated in paragraph 2. The minutae of the land work are detailed in my Descriptive Report, so I will only repeat that the accomplished sheet is in all points rigidly controlled by the four triangulation stations plotted thereon. There were no errors of adjustment. The values of those stations are taken directly from the photostated list you sent to me. I have already noted that those values do not fit the section of topographic sheet 3274. forwarded from the Office. I went again to mention that my position of the Hana L.H. as scaled from my sheet (see List of Positions) does not agree with that in the Light List, being presumably different datums.
- 4. Referring to your paragraph 4 I quote " you will note a sunken rock is shown on the section of sheet No. 3274 nearly in the center of the cove You will please examine this locality and advise whether or not the rock ex-

- That certainly exists but it is not a sunken rock but rather an extensive patch: it is nearly always breaking. It is well developed on the Harbor Commission plat. However there actually IS a rock, but it is in another locality - further out, just NNW of channel buoy No. 2, and therefore off the steamer track. Hearing rumors of this rock I first went to the top of the overhanding cliffs of Kauiki Head from which point of ventage I easily saw indications of it. So, knowing that the Harbor Commission had already found twenty one feet in that spot but that a vessel drawing less was said recently to have struck there I went out intending to gettershoaler sounding if there was one as I assumed. I spent an entire afternoon hovering abut this rock, trying for a shoaler value. I at last got a sixteen, reduced. This was the least I could find. I verified the 21 pinnacle shown on the Harbor Commission plat and the position but I do not feel certain that my value is exactly on their pinnacle, but rather a bit on the north side of it, probably corresponding with their 21.5 The rock does seem to have two points as near as I could judge: no wire drag was necessary: it is easily seen. This rock breaks only in heavy weather, and is not to be confused by vessels entering with the breakers seen in the centre of the cove - the patch before-mention-
- I made a careful test of the Harbor Commissioners hydrographic survey, and have to report that I find it excellent, and well adapted for transfer to our phoposed chart of Hana Cove. I am told here that thersoundings are reduced for tide. I checked by running some cross lines. These lines were held for the most part rigidly on ranges, by an expert, and a good part of the fixes were by means of cross ranges. Such sextant fixes as there were I took myself: and I could easily do this without appreciable error, since I can follow one angle almost instaneously by another, and the boat (a great hulf of a ship's lifeboat) we could scarcely propel through the water. This boat was given us free by the plantation: it was the only one available. You can verify the comparison by pantographic or other methods. I used a protractor, with extended arms. I put their station "Jake" on my sheet so as to aid in the comparison. I suggest, then, the common stations, Nanualele, Make, Lighthouse, and Kauiki be used. Do not expect a rigid agreement: for the bottom is quite irregular, being coral, and other rock. As I was not instructed to make a hydrographic survey the records are not complete, being for my own personal information: but I send in the record book I used, in case you wish to have my findings verified. I also enclose a tide book. I observer for LLW on several consecutive days: I did not take the average of these for my datum, since most were minus tides, but, using them as a guide and check, ladopted 1.7 as my datum on staff, since this was reading of my LLW on June 20 on which day the book shows neither a plus nor a minus. So I took 1.7 off all my soundings. I spent two days on this hydrographic investigation.
- 6. My Estimates asked for two men for ten days at \$2.00 but but this abnormally heavy boat made necessary the employment of more men to handle it all. But since this was for two days only and the total is less than the \$40 I had available for the two hands, I feel that you will approve.
- 7. I draw to your attention the useful Steamer Range. I have submitted a photograph with the thought that the Admiralty custom might possibly be followed, and a sketch placed on the chart of that aid, invaluable in the restrictharbor of Hana.

- 1. The Topographic records conform to the requirements of the General Instructions. The sounding record does not conform to the requirements, but this is accounted for by the surveyor because the work is an examination only rather than a complete survey.
- 2. The plan and character of the topographic survey conform to the requirements of the General Instructions.
- 3. The plan and extent of the topographic and hydrographic surveys satisfy the specific instructions.
- 4. The sounding line crossings are adequate.
- 5. The topographic drawing was done in the field, but the hydrographic work was plotted in the office.
- 6. The hydrographic development is not sufficiently close to enable the curves to be completely drawn. It was made for the purpose of checking the accuracy of the 1923 survey by the Board of Harbor Commissioners (B.P. 18797). It is believed to be sufficiently accurate and complete for this purpose, but it will be necessary to enlarge Captain Hand's survey to that of the blue print in order to enable the test to be made.

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- 7. The junction with the adjoining topographic survey is satisfactory.
- 8. No further surveying is required within the area covered by the sheet.
- 9. The character and scope of the topographic surveying are excellent that of the hydrographic work is satisfactory.
