GENERAL INFORMATION:

Instructions dated November 7, 1933.

The information used in the compilation of this sheet was obtained from the notes and sketches on the field photographs and from members of the field inspection party in questionable areas.

The tide in this area is approximately two feet (2:). Due to the low ground in this area, the horizonal distance between the mean high water line and mean low water lines varies from approximately 5 meters to approximately 30 meters along the shore, and in some instances a portion of the area is flooded to a considerable distance inland during the high tide. But in some cases where the land is higher, no marked change between high and low water lines was apparent and the effect of the tide on determination of the shore line was neglected due to the small scale of the photographs.

The land area of this sheet consists of low marsh lands cut by numerous bayous and small streams. This area is sparsely inhabited, there being only a few fishing camps along the shores of the bayous and other bodies of water. There are no cultivated areas and there has been no development in the area covered by this sheet. There are extensive growths of mangle brush along the shore lines and along the banks of the streams.

This sheet was compiled from the U.S. Army Air Corps, five lens, Type T-3A Camera No. 32-3, photograph numbers 824-831 and 1051-1054. The west flight falls approximately along Longitude 89°26'15" and the east flight approximately along Longitude 89°20'00".

CONTROL:

(A) SOURCES.

The following sources of control were used in the compilation of this sheet:

(a) Triangulation by G. C. Mattison, 1922.

(b) Triangulation by F. S. Borden, 1922. (c) F.B.T.Siems, 1921.
The geographic positions of the triangulation stations
located by the above parties were on the N. A. datum.
Recent triangulation work in this area gave geographic
positions on N. A. 1927 datum on triangulation stations
De Seiete 1927, Bayou Cook 1883-1927, Bijou 1922, Buras 1922.
By comparing the N. A. 1927 geographic positions and those
on old datum of the aforementioned triangulation stations,
a factor of correction was derived, which, when applied to
geographic positions of other stations in this area that
were on the old datum, changed them so as to coincide with
the N. A. 1927 positions. The factors used were -2.9 m. in

Latitude (forward) and \$16.4 m. in Longitude (forward). These factors were applied to all geographic positions of stations that were on the old datum and converted them to N. A. 1927 datum. No difficulty was experienced in checking the control used in the compilation of this sheet.

Due to the washing away of the shore line along the main bodies of water a considerable number of central stations established in 1922 have been washed away.

(B) Errors.

The control is adequate for the compilation of this sheet and the radial line plot produced good, well defined points of intersection.

(C) Discrepancies.

No discrepancy in position of control station was found and no control stations established by any other organization were used in the compilation of this sheet.

COMPILATION:

(A) Method.

The usual five lens radial line method of plotting was used in the compilation of this sheet.

(B) Adjustment of Plot.

The photographs in these strips appear to be free from excessive tilt and scale fluctuations and the radial line plot requires no unusual adjustments.

(C) Interpretation.

The graphic symbols used in the drafting of this sheet are standard and approved by the Board of Surveys and Maps (1932). The only symbol not agreeing with above specifications was the symbol (i) used in the drafting of this sheet to denote mangle brush. All bayous and larger streams are shown by a double full line and those of lesser importance and of insufficient size to enable the draftsman to show without exaggeration are shown by a single full line. Shallow mud flats covered with several inches of water are shown by a broken line. Sand and shell shoal areas are shown by a broken line at the low water level and the customary sand and shell symbol was drawn in between this low water line and the main shore line. In areas where there was no field inspection available, the classification of features was determined by close inspection of the field photographs.

(D) Information From Other Sources.

The information used in the compilation of this sheet was obtained from (1) the notes and sketches on the field photographs, (2) U. S. C. & G. S. chart #1272, (3) U. S. C. & G. S. air photo compilation sheet of this area (1922) by G. C. Mattison, Chief of Party. T4030 (1922) There was no information used except that obtained from the above sources.

(E) Conflicting Names.

The names on this sheet were taken from the U. S. C. & G. S. #1272 and Airphoto Compilation Sheet (1922) by G. C. Mattison, Chief of Party, and from sources stated above, and the following conflicts in names were found:

COMPARISON WITH OTHER SURVEYS:

In comparing this sheet with the U. S. C. & G. S. Topographic Sheet No. 4030 (1922), U. S. C. & G. S. Chart No. 1272, U. S. E. Corps' Map of South Louisiana, and U. S. Geological Survey Sheet "Forts", it is observed that the main shore line has retained its general shape but, due to tidal conditions, there has been considerable washing away of the shore area, and Hog Islandshas been reduced about 50% in area due to these conditions. See also last par on This page.

In comparing this sheet with air photo topographic sheet No. 4030 (1922) it was found that with the exception of changes in the shore line brought about by the tidal conditions which caused considerable washing away of the shore, it was found that the two sheets agreed in every detail. The larger streams and bayous retained their same course and approximate size.

This sheet compares favorably with Air Photo Compilation Sheets 5318 to the west, and 5401 to the south. Junctions with T5318 and T5401 cheeled in office before printing LANDMARKS:

There are no landmarks in this area that can be recommended as aids to navigation. The small camps are more or less of a temporary nature.

RECOMMENDATION FOR FURTHER SURVEY:

The compilation of this sheet is believed to have a probable error of 8 meters in well defined detail and 15 meters for other data. There was no detail of importance except the shore line at high tide. The shell reefs of what was at one time Battledore

Island were drawn in from the "D" print of photo number 831.

The last photo in the flight.

To the best of my knowledge, this sheet is complete in all detail of importance for charting purposes within the accuracy stated above, and no additional survey is required.

Review of Air Photo Compilation 5328 (1934)

Names: New names shown on this compilation have been accepted as submitted by the compiler pending Mr. Bacon's decision. The names Sable Island and Bird Island, mentioned on page 4 of the report are shown to agree with the present chart 1272. All new names submitted are shown on U.S.G.S. quadrangle, "Forts". The term new names applies to all names not shown on present U.S.C. and G.S. charts.

Comparison with other surveys: Comparison with chart 1272 and T 4030 (1922). in this office shows the following changes in addition to those mentioned on page 4 of the descriptive report:

1. Little Battledor I. shown on chart 1272 at Lat. 29°30', Long. 89°27' is not shown on this compilation. This island is not mentioned in the descriptive report. It is probably off the limits of the photographs.

Reese was furnished bromide copies of T 4030 (1922) to the scale of his compilation for a detailed comparison with the 1922 survey.
