Control.

The control of this work is good, being provided by the system of Triangulation immediately proceding.

This strech of river is quite straight, running
Northwest, averages nearly two miles wide, with the large
Poropotank Creek entering at its upper end.

Shores.

The shores are generally flatty low marshy and muddy , excepting

about Cappahosic and to Allmondsville where they are sandy, with the clay banks and land behind running to 20 feet and above. The shores are usually wooded but the land just back is cleared.

Landings.

The landings are Claybank and Allmonds where Piers are built out to the edge of the channel, from which the produce of the surrounding country is shipped and supplies recieved.

They are very small places with a Post Office, Wharfhouse and store. Cappahosic, between these two, is a better town with two large stores but no pier, though one is to be built.

Water.

The water of the River here is salty, the river being so wide that the tidal currents are vastly more potent than any current caused by inflows. Artesian water is found to some extent most everywhere.

Creeks

There are several small creeks used for planting oysters, but of no commercial importance; but Poropotank Creek which enters 4 I/4 miles above Allmonds, furnishes navigation to six miles above its mouth, and furnishes a great deal of wood, timber and lumber.

Land.

There are streches of good productive land, but much of this area is clay and "piney". The surface is much cut up by ridges, Sloughs, Swamps, and Creeks. Desc. Rept. Topographic. Sheet.B.O.S. (686) York, River Va.O.W.F

Occupation.

This country is quite generally occupied, noticeably so about Claybank, Cappahosic, and Allmonds.

Farming, Oystering, Fishing, Distributing and Sailing boats are the occupations of the people.

Products.

The commodities shipped are grain, poultry, some cattle and garden truck; also various enterprises in freighting, Wood, Ties, Eumber and poles are carried on.


