The average width of the river is $\frac{1}{2}$ mile. There are no towns on this sheet, but four landings that ship and receive merchandise, namely Leitch, Fruehman's Point, Deep Landing and Holland's Cliff. No railroads nor electric lines touch any of the Patuxent River Sheets and there is no regular steamer in competition with the Maryland, Delaware and Virginia R.R. Co.'s steamboats.

The soil is of a light silty nature and erodes readily. The shores of the river are sandy or marshy. The sur-

face of the land is rolling with many elevations and depressions; along the shore it varies from flat and marshy to bluffs 50 feet high, and further back but within $\frac{3}{4}$ mile from 75 to 200 feet.


There is but little timber near the river but more further back. Farming is the principal occupation of the people and the products shipped are corn, wheat, tobacco, peaches, and tomatoes. The wagonroads are generally sandy and heavy. The price of farm land varies from \$3 to \$50 an acre.

The average width of the river is $\frac{1}{2}$ mile; and it af-
 fords a good channel of 13 to 15 feet depth. There are no
 villages on the river, but there are four landings
 that ship and receive freight and produce, namely

Leitch, Freeman's Point, Deep Landing and Holland's
Cliff. The cargoes shipped are ties, poles, wood, wood for
paper mills, lumber, corn, wheat, tobacco, tomatoes and
fish. There is no line in competition with the steamer of the
Maryland, Delaware and Virginia Railroad Company for this shipping
Statistics.
