

DESCRIPTIVE REPORT.

Descriptive Report Topographic Sheet No 3097

Survey was made on a seale of 1-10 000. Controlled by traverse using P.T. telemeter rods. Later several points were determined by triangulation and sufficient points on the sheet located to orient it.

The North bank of the Kenai River is a high bluff ,Sandig.

The country back of the bluff is it level and all densely wooded.

The village of Kenai is located on the North bank of the river. Population is about 400 natives and squaw men. Principal industries, fisheries in summer, and exploiting parties after big game shooting in the winter. The Church is the most prominent building. Is painted white and distinguished by the greek cross.

A salmon cannery is maintained by the N.W. Fisheries Co. of Seattle, during the summer. The vessels arrive about April 1st and leave early in September. Capacity of the cannery is about 30 000 cases of salmon. Employ's about 100 people, whites, natives, and orientals. The cannery has a good sixed store where supplies may be had in limited quantities. Fresh, water may be had at the cannery wharf after June 1st until Sept 1st. Wharf can be used only at high water and when not in use by the cannery vessels. At low water the 1.w. line extends some 10 ft outside of the wharf. The wharf is torn down about Sept, 1sit.

There are two small stores in the town where provisions and some supplies in limited quantities may be obtained.

There are also the buildings of an abandoned cannery about 1 mile from the village.

Several small vessels call at Kenai enroute to and from Port Graham and Seldovia to points at the head of the Inlet.

The N.W. Fisheries 60 has two steamers here and a sailing vessel anchored some five miles off shore.

During the summer mail is brought up promptly after mail steamers call at Seldovia. In winter there is a monthly mail service by carrier.

The river is reported to freeze and vessels can not enter shortly after Dec. Lst. Ice breaks about April 1st; but vessels using the river at that time must enter on the flood tide and leave before the ebb brings down ice. Vessels can lie in the river after May 1st to 10th.

The range of tide averages about 18 ft. maximum range about 28 ft. Currents are strong runnuing from 3 to 6 knots. The flood current is reported to run about 15 miles up the river.
